Visitors flock to SG1 exhibition

three-day public exhibition showing the emerging plans for the regeneration of Stevenage town centre - known as SG1 - attracted over 500 visitors.

There was an enthusiastic response and hundreds of comments received from local residents and businesses who were given further insight into the ambitious regeneration plans.

The partnership between Stevenage Borough Council and its development partner, Mace aims to transform the town centre with new homes, shops, offices, places to eat and drink, leisure facilities and public services.

SG1 will be delivered in phases over the next ten years with the first phase of works, including two development plots, on the former police station on Southgate, and Swingate House and car park close to the West Gate shopping centre.

The start of the scheme will be the upgrading of the Town Square and work on this is expected to commence in the last quarter of 2019.

Protect your heritage

o you own or know of a building that you think is a valuable heritage asset of the town and think it warrants recognition?

Following the demolition of a Cottage in Fishers Green despite heavy public opposition, the Council is keen to protect buildings which, unlike listed buildings and those in conservation areas, are not currently protected.

The Planning Policy Team at Stevenage Borough Council is currently looking for buildings across the town to add to the Stevenage Local List of Heritage Assets. So far 136 assets that are worthy of being included have been identified.

The Council may also look at applying an Article 4 Direction on the heritage assets that are identified, which remove certain permitted development rights. This could include the right to demolish or alter certain aspects of a building without prior written consent.

If you know of a building that deserves to be included in the Stevenage Local Listing, we'd like to hear from you. Buildings would qualify based on one or more of the following criteria:

- Historic Interest
- Architectural Interest
- Rarity or Representativeness
- Landmark Quality
- Group Value
- Social & Communal Value
- Age



Ever wonder who the people are behind your council services? Let us introduce you to some of our members of staff...

Tracy Jackson Housing Supply Manager

What does your role involve? I'm responsible for assisting residents who have been working with our Housing Options Team to find suitable privately rented accommodation. I have a fantastic team of four Housing Supply Co-ordinators who run our Next Step Lets service like clockwork. Two of the team have worked for Estate Agents and know what landlords require. The other two have lots of housing experience so give tenants support and make sure everything runs smoothly.

How long have you been in the role? Just over a year. I was a Housing Advice Officer before which gave me a good all round knowledge of housing including housing law and benefits.

What's the most challenging part of it? Finding enough properties with affordable rent to let to our clients. Once landlords find out we offer financial incentives and we don't charge for our services, they're usually happy to set the rent at a reasonable amount.

Why is it a good service for landlords to use? Landlords need to have the rent paid and the property looked after and we can help with that. The Next Step Lets service supports landlords throughout the tenancy. This starts from finding the right tenant, doing viewings and inventories along with all the move in documentation through to exit inspections. If either the landlord or the tenant has a query, the team are there to offer advice and support. This avoids problems and in fact our average length of tenancy is six and a half years.

If I have a property to rent how do I get in touch? Either call me, Emma Shirley or Will Peters on 01438 242909 or email housingsupplyteam@stevenage.gov. uk. If you're passing Daneshill House, feel free to come into the Customer Services Centre and ask for one of us.

Aldon Patience Town Centre Warden

"My role is to be the eyes and ears of the community. I work with the town centre manager, in conjunction with our elected members and officer colleagues, CCTV, police, and other emergency services to insure the town is a safe place. I also act as a council link to the community when I do my patrols and try and help with any queries people might have about fly-tipping antisocial behaviour etc.

"The biggest issues I face are shoplifting and kids riding their bikes through the town centre. I manage this situation by working closely with CCTV, police, and the retailers. I am on the town link radio that means we can communicate relevant information to try and prevent these situations.

"Generally, I find that when I deal with people in the town they are very friendly towards me, at the start they would ask me questions about who I was and what I do and now people come up to me with queries or issues they may have.

"If people have any concerns they can talk to me to me about things. That's what I'm there for.

"I enjoy the role. It is very satisfying. Recently I helped a a mum find her little girl who was lost in the town centre. That's rewarding."

Aldon, says many people are talking to him about the town centre regeneration project.

"They do talk about a lot and they seem quite excited by it," he says.
