Greedy goose Gordon goes global

A children's story-style booklet on the dangers of feeding bread to ducks and geese and written by the council's green spaces officer has been adopted on the other side of the Atlantic.

Gordon the Greedy Goose , written by council officer Joel Gainsford, tells the story of a goose who gorges on too much bread and finds himself unable to fly. It was written as an allegory to warn people about the dangers of feeding too much bread to the waterfowl at Fairlands Valley Lakes.

Now, MacArthur Park in Little Rock, Arkansas, has adopted the story for its own wildfowl awareness campaign.

"We obtained permission from Stevenage Borough Council to re-print this booklet ," said Stephan McAteer, Director." and will distribute it with the assistance of a Conservation License Plate Education Grant from the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission. By educating park visitors about the harmful effects of feeding geese, we hope to develop a greater appreciation of appropriate interaction with waterfowl and the environment. Visitors and geese will be happier."

Life's a gas for new Liberty apprentice

A young Stevenage tenant is starting the year with bright prospects thanks to property services company, Liberty Group - a long-standing partner of Stevenage Borough Council.

Sam Haynes, a Stevenage Borough Council tenant, secured a gas engineer apprenticeship with the company, and undertook a 15week training course to secure a CGLI Level 3 Gas Diploma.

He joined Liberty at the beginning of January 2019 and will now shadow experienced engineers working on Liberty's contract with Stevenage Borough Council.

He said: "I've always wanted to work in this sector after being inspired by my Dad, and my training with Barrett Bell was a great way to get a foot in the door. I'm really excited to have been given the opportunity to develop my skills and experience with Liberty Group and putting what I've learnt into practice."

His manager, Dave Sandford, added: "Sam is proving to be a confident engineer with great customer service skills, and we are continuing to support him and coach him until he is ready to work independently."

GOYEARS OF Stevenage DAY STEVENAGE DAY

his year marks the Diamond anniversary (60 years) of the annual Stevenage Day festival, the town's biggest charity fundraising event and there are still opportunities to book your organisation's stall at this year's special show.

WORKING FLAT OUT ON REFURBISHMENTS

ouncil officials met up with SBC partners Wates Group and Mulalley Construction to venture out in plummeting temperatures and check on the progress of the £45million worth of major refurbishments being carried out on 550 blocks of flats throughout the town.

The five-year project, designed to prolong the life of 4,000 homes in the town, includes repairs to roofs, windows, structural repairs, rewiring, fencing, paving, signs and some redecoration of communal areas.

Work is underway in various locations across the town including Pitt Court, Albert Street, Southend Close and Plash Drive with work shortly set to commence at Gladstone Court, Kimbolton Crescent, Skipton Close, Four Acres and Julian's Road. Look for the Stevenage Borough Council signage around the town and you will get a sense of how much work is taking place.

The council is working closely with construction partners Mulalley and Wates, which is also putting back into the community with the creation of new locally-staffed jobs and future career initiatives through its Building Futures scheme, which sees trainees learn a variety of construction skills before eventually obtaining their qualifications, enabling them to work in the sector.

Launched in 2005, more than 1,500 learners nationwide have completed the course so far. All graduates of the course also receive six months support afterwards to help them find a job.

Activity has also included careers events at North Herts College and Marriotts School.



Schools unite against knife crime

Raife crime is an epidemic that affects not only inner-cities but is fast spreading into suburban areas as it reaches record levels in the UK.

According to the latest figures from the Office of National Statistics, the number of fatal stabbings in England and Wales in the 12 months leading up to March 2018 was the highest since records began, with 285 killings by a knife or sharp instrument.

One in four of these were young men aged between 18-24 and there was a 45 per cent increase in the number of victims aged 16-24.

The problem has been exacerbated by many factors including and the spread of so-called 'County Lines' where drug gangs are spreading out of cities and into suburbs.

In a bid to stem this rising tide of violence, the council is part of a joint initiative with Hertfordshire Constabulary, Hertfordshire County Council and a number of third party support agencies to increase awareness of knife crime and the issues around it.

Five secondary schools in Stevenage recently took part in a project to explore the reasons why young people carry knives.

Operation Edge is a competition funded by local and county councillors and the Safer



Neighbourhood Initiative Fund. The schools each made a film on the subject which was assessed by a panel of experts, including TV Actor Kevin Whately, Chief Constable Charlie Hall and Film Composer David Arnold.

The finalists took part in a red carpet screening event at Stevenage Cineworld, which saw the film by Marriotts School declared the overall winner, with Barnwell School named as the runner-up.




Spring into action - volunteer!

With the return of (we hope) better weather, spring brings with it fresh opportunities to get outside and enjoy the town's open spaces. But did you know that you can double up on that enjoyment by becoming a green spaces volunteer and help keep the town in the trim? Read on to find out more...

Getting out in the fresh air, meeting new people and becoming active in the community brings huge benefits in terms of health, well-being, fitness and confidence. And our green space volunteers are also a vital asset that helps to maintain the town's green spaces such as parks, woodlands and wildlife reserves.

As a volunteer, you will join a team of staff and other volunteers to help undertake improvements to open space projects around the town. There will be opportunities for activities in different types of green space including parks, woodlands and ponds undertaking a broad variety of tasks.



Your personal preferences will be taken into account but activities may include woodland ride maintenance and coppicing, bulb planting, ecological surveys, improvements to ponds, and the installation of bird and bat boxes. It might also include:

- Promotion of green spaces and environmental projects
- Practical conservation and habitat
 management
- Wildlife surveys
- Litter picking
- Assisting with events and community projects
- Building and repairing fences, picnic tables, and other structures
- Site clearance including clearing of scrub and other vegetation
- Digging
- Weeding
- Planting
- Pond clearance



Or if you're not keen on that....

- Talks and presentations to local groups and organisations.
- Taking photographs

You don't have to devote your entire existence to it. Volunteers are welcome to attend for as much or as little time as they can spare. Whether you have one hour or four hours to volunteer, everybody's help is welcomed and valued.

Sessions will normally take place at weekends, although there may also be some opportunity for mid-week volunteering.

You do not even need specific skills or experience. We encourage and welcome people from all sectors of our community to volunteer and no previous experience is required. You just need to enjoy the outdoors and want to make a difference to the town where you live.



However, if you have any skills/ experience/knowledge that you think might be useful let us know as we may even be able to develop new volunteering opportunities on the back of this.

New and existing volunteers are always supported and guided by staff working for the council's Environmental Services or our partners. You will receive support and supervision from the member of staff with whom you are working. There will also be opportunities for you to talk about any great ideas you might have for volunteering tasks in other parts of the town.

Once we receive your completed form we will contact you to arrange a mutually convenient time to meet, to see proof of your identity and address and to answer any questions that you may have. We will also require you to sign a Volunteer Agreement which outlines what you can expect from us and what we expect from you as a volunteer.

You will then be provided with a volunteer starter pack which will contain additional information that may be of interest, such as forthcoming volunteering opportunities and on community green spaces in Stevenage.

COUNCIL HOUSING:

Back in the good old days, getting a council house used to involve the relatively simple matter of putting your name on the waiting list and.... well, waiting a while. The opportunity to buy your own council home and a significant shortfall in the number of new homes being built has created a huge scarcity in available homes. So what are the facts about council housing now?....

How many council homes are there in Stevenage? There are currently 7808 homes.

How does that compare with the rest of the country?

Just eight per cent of the UK population now live in councilowned property. In Stevenage the figure is 28 per cent.

Why are there so few houses available?

Of the 274 general need lets in 2017/18, 158 were either houses or bungalows. Generally, there are

fewer local authority social housing properties available due to Right to Buy; massive under-funding of the social build program; removal of building grants; borrowing restrictions on local authorities and demand on social housing has also increased as property values have increased etc.

When my children turn 18 and want their own home, can they simply turn up at the Council Office and be given a house?

Not really, no. Once your child turns 18 they can apply to be registered on the Housing Needs Register, this means completing an application form. You can get a form by contacting our Customer Service Centre. Everyone who successfully registers for housing will be notified of their registration date; banding and reference number to login to the Homes 4 U website so that bids can be made.


https://home4u.org.uk Available properties (including Housing Association properties) are advertised on a weekly basis and applicants can express an interest in them.

Why does my position on the Housing Register list change?

Your position on the shortlist is based on your priority banding and the number of applicants that may bid on the homes advertised; therefore your position may change on a weekly basis. For example, in one week you may have the second position, but in the following week, should someone with a higher priority place a bid your position will go down. This means that your position is never static and will move up and down depending on who else bids and what homes are available in any given week.

Why doesn't the council advertise all their homes when they become vacant?

There are instances where we have a legal requirement to house applicants, such as in urgent cases of repair or if a specially adapted home becomes available for example. Although rare at times we may also have to withdraw a property that has been advertised. Again, this will usually be due to the urgent rehousing of an applicant in relation to the examples given above.



FACTS AND FICTION

I was accepted onto the Housing Register sometime ago, why would my housing application bidding date change?

Once your application has been approved and added to the housing register, you are provided with a priority date. This date will remain with you during the whole time you are bidding on properties. The only reason the date will change is when you have a change of circumstances which will change the banding you are in. An example of this is adding another adult/child to your application and/ or a medical priority banding is applied.

How many larger-sized homes does SBC have and how often are they available?

In the financial year April 2017-March 2018 and the first two quarters of this year April to September 2018, only 15-larger sized properties became available. Stevenage has a limited number of properties, the information below shows how many properties of the larger size we have and how many were available to let in the timespan listed above **3 x 6 Bedroom Houses** – zero have been available for re-let in the time span

50 x 5 Bedroom Houses – 3 have been available for re-let in the time span

366 x 4 Bedroom Houses – 12 have been available for re-let in the time span

Is it easier to get a house if you present yourself as homeless?

If you present yourself as homeless, it doesn't always mean you will be housed in Council accommodation. In April 2018, new homelessness legislation came into force called the Homelessness Reduction Act. Local Authorities have new duties to work with anyone presenting to them as potentially homeless and to try and prevent them becoming so. Each case is allocated to a Housing Options caseworker and they work with each individual or family in drawing up a personalised housing plan to help them keep their current home or find alternative accommodation. Both parties must agree to the steps in the plan. If the local authority cannot prevent someone becoming homeless they must try

to relieve their homelessness by helping them to find alternative accommodation such as a private tenancy. If someone does become homeless, is found to be a priority need and has not caused their own homelessness, the Council's help can include the offer of a tenancy in a Private or Social Housing home.

What is the council doing to house people sleeping rough?

The Housing Options team walk around the Town Centre and Old Town every weekday and try to engage with any rough sleepers they see and to encourage them to come in to the Council for advice and assistance. Our Community Safety team also visit areas where rough sleepers are reported. We are able to refer to hostels and The Haven and help those sleeping rough to engage with other support services. New-look for Kenilworth Close

Complete revamp of Kenilworth Close, in Bragbury End has been given the go-ahead and demolition is likely to begin this year in Spring, with construction planned to begin in the summer.

It will include a mix of houses and flats which are for sale, affordable rent and social rent and will help to meet the needs of a diverse local community by bringing a varied mix of property types to the area.

Some 236 new homes are being built, of which 118 will be for social and affordable rented accommodation.

The development includes a new state of the art independent living scheme for older people consisting of 88 one and two bedroom apartments. It will also boast new facilities including a roof terrace garden, a café that will be open to the wider public as well as the residents of the scheme and a much improved and more structured green space.

There will also be four new improved retail units included in the development.

Ever wonder who the people are behind your council services? Let us introduce you to some of our key members of staff...

Danny Stearn, Refuse & Recycling Operative

As well as keeping Stevenage clean and tidy, and helping the team recycle more than 400 tonnes of waste materials every month, Danny will be running the London Marathon this year to raise money for Kidney Research UK - a charity which funds research that focuses on the prevention, treatment and management of kidney disease.

"My Grandad, my absolute hero, needed a kidney transplant when my Mum was only eight years old," explained Danny. "Due to the success of this transplant, he then went on to live another 25 years and I couldn't be more grateful that this helped my Grandad live for as long as he could.

"I want to raise money for this charity to help other people just like my Grandad that may be in the same

situation so that they can live a normal life. Right now, the lives of over three million people in the UK are threatened by chronic kidney disease and no one knows when it may strike next, it can affect anyone, young or old.

"Those that know me, will know I don't do much running and never set foot in the gym. You're more likely to find me in a pub with a beer in my hand so this really is a big challenge for me and I honestly wouldn't be able to do it without all the love and support you have shown me."

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
