# Don't let the bad bugs bite

We all love the warmer weather, but so do all manner of insects and creepy crawlies, which can become a real pest in the summer months. Two in particular might require specialist treatment to remove....

Wasps §

Let's face it, wasps are not a popular addition to any event and their reputation as the ruiner of picnics, barbecues, pub gardens and, in a lot of cases, people's homes, precedes them and is well deserved.

As the weather warms up, wasps and other pests become an increasing problem throughout the town, and in excess of 110 wasp nests were treated last year.

In early spring you may see wasps looking for somewhere to build a nest. It is easy, however, to mistake our friendly and much-needed bees for wasps as they are similar in size and shape (particularly Mortar, Masonry or Mining bees).

Bees are active during April, May and early-June with peak activity in May - too early in the year to be wasps. Swarming bees can be seen in late April to early May and are also often mistaken for wasps.

We need bees. Pollination is vital for food crops, industrial crops, flowers, recreation areas, and some types of wood. In short, let bees be. Their numbers are dwindling and if the bees disappeared we would disappear with them.

# **Treatment**

Wasp nests are usually treated from late June onwards.

To request a chargeable wasp treatment please contact us online or telephone 01438 242908 leaving your name and address, telephone number and email (if you have one).

the pest treatment you need and approximate location of the nest. You will be contacted within three to four working days to arrange an appointment and take payment. They will try to contact you up to three times, if they cannot contact you after the third attempt they will close the request.

The charge for a wasp treatment is £64 or £48 if you are in receipt of income related benefit.

# Signs you have a nest

Wasps will build nests in various places; a new nest is formed in spring by the queen wasps that have been hibernating over winter Nests are made from chewed wood mixed with the wasp's saliva and are usually a pale beige or grey colour

They can be up to 120cm wide and contain in the region of 5,000 to 10,000 wasps, although smaller nests can be found in restricted places

In early spring or during a mild winter, the larger queen wasps may be seen and can be destroyed using a domestic insecticide spray

# **Preventing wasps nesting**

If you can block any holes in your eaves, soffits and brickwork to prevent wasps entering and building a nest.

In early spring it's also a good idea to remove any accumulation of vegetation or rubbish.

# Plan bee

While wasps are a pest, bees on the other hand are a vital part of our eco-system and are the world's most important pollinator of food crops. It is estimated that one third of the food that we consume each day relies on pollination mainly by bees, but also by other insects, birds and bats.

Right now, however, a phenomenon called Colony Collapse Disorder means honeybee numbers are in decline, so they need to be looked after. Einstein may (or may not) have said that once the bees are gone mankind would follow within four years.


If a nest isn't causing any health and safety risks it should be left undisturbed. But occasionally it will need to be removed, which is a specialist job.

Recently, a bees' nest of some 40,000 of the creatures was discovered in the roof of a property in Blythe Close off Scarborough Avenue, for which the council had to call in a specialist bee removal company called.....Bee Gone who relocated the bees to a more appropriate place. # Plan to save the planet

The council is fully on-board with plans to significantly reduce the town's carbon emissions, achieving a net zero goal by 2050. Here's what that means...





he council has passed a motion declaring a climate change emergency and has decided to work towards achieving net zero emissions by 2050.

Which means achieving a balance between the amount of CO2 created and the amount that can be offset against planting trees or sucking CO2 out of the atmosphere.

The motion was proposed by Cllr John Gardner, Executive Member for Environment and Regeneration, who said: "Failure to achieve this level of reduction in the rate of temperature increase has been spelled out by the World's scientific community as our apocalyptic ending. We do not own this planet, we share it with hundreds of living species on land and sea. The living diversity of our planet and the complex relationships that exist in food chains are currently being damaged by climate change."

The policy is in line with the Government's own recently announced plan to reduce UK-wide emissions to net zero level by 2050, and will require changes to local policy and infrastructure alongside national initiatives in all sectors, including industry and commercial, transport and domestic sources.

Emissions would need to reduce much quicker, requiring rapid

and wide-scale changes in energy production, supply and usage at the national level.

Stevenage's latest carbon dioxide emission measurements show some 42 per cent from industry and commercial, 33 per cent from domestic sources and 25 per cent from transport.

Local measures will include:

- 1: Reducing the council's building and fleet emissions, developing and investing in carbon reduction projects
- 2: Supporting residents and businesses in Stevenage to reduce their emissions using the powers and funding currently available to the Council.
- 3: Establishing a Stevenage Climate Charter calling on all organisations,

businesses and individuals to create their own Carbon Management Plans.

- 4: Creating a Stevenage People's Assembly to monitor the Town's progress on Climate Emergency Actions against targets set by both the Council and other stakeholders.
- 5: Working with the Hertfordshire Sustainability Forum, the Hertfordshire Waste Partnership and Hertfordshire Infrastructure & Planning Partnership on joint measures and actions.

In addition, the council will seek support from government, industry and regulators to implement the necessary changes with funding, transformed national infrastructure, policy, new technologies and legislation.

# What we want

- Energy-efficient public transport across the country, including the introduction of electric buses.

# **Culture of change**

A silver anniversary celebration for Stevenage Festival was the perfect opportunity to launch our new cultural strategy as part of the town's future transformation...

tevenage Borough Council, with support from key partners has developed a new 10-year cultural strategy to enhance the town's arts and heritage offering, called Stevenage Re-imagined, which launched in the town centre last month.

The plan focuses on cultural engagement, providing opportunities for local people to contribute to the town's regeneration ambitions, and make Stevenage an attractive destination for all.

It was commissioned by Stevenage Borough Council and Arts Council England and developed through extensive community consultation. One of its key aims is to drive collective ownership and collaborative action by organisations and individuals. In order to facilitate this, a partnership called the Arts & Heritage Forum has been formed and is open for anyone in Stevenage to join and contribute to the cultural growth of the town.

This year also marks the 25th anniversary of Stevenage Festival, and the Arts & Heritage Forum hosted a free fun day (led by Stevenage Arts Guild and Stevenage Borough Council) in the Town Square, launching both Stevenage Re-imagined and the festival. There was music and dance with a fusion piece for steel pans and a drummer invasion.

The festival is held every two years and is centred around community productions at the Gordon Craig Theatre, giving local people a chance to express themselves in a range of arts including music, dance, theatre and also a series of fringe events all over town.

Activity at the Gordon Craig culminated in a Silver Anniversary Concert which showcased emerging talent and performers from the town who have gone on to make a name for themselves in their respective genres.

Cllr Richard Henry, Executive
Member for Children, Young People
and Leisure said: "Our cultural
strategy is a culmination of the
efforts of a range of arts and heritage
organisations, striving to make
Stevenage a destination creative
town, as it enters a bold new era
with a multi-million pound town
centre regeneration scheme.

"We are really excited to be working with Arts Council England and other partners to realise these ambitions. Where better to launch this strategy than with Stevenage Arts Guild at the launch of Stevenage Festival as it celebrates its 25th Anniversary and shows to the world the fantastic contributions arts and culture already makes to our town."







# More new homes on the way

Stevenage Borough Council is continuing to provide council and affordable housing throughout the town and making progress with its ambitious regeneration plan for the Town Centre.....

Stevenage Borough Council has been granted approval for the development of three new housing projects, which will add more than 50 new homes, 38 of which are affordable and social rented housing.

The new builds will see a private development of 21 apartments in North Road, the proceeds from the sale of which, will contribute towards the cost of the construction of social housing elsewhere in the town.

In Shephall Way, nine new apartments are being built and there will also be 29 new apartments in Symonds Green.

Construction will begin later this year and is expected to be completed towards the end of 2020.

Cllr Jeanette Thomas, Executive Member for Housing, Health and Older People, commented: "Stevenage Borough Council continues to fulfil its promise to provide quality, affordable housing for the people of the town and these new developments deliver more than 50 new homes. Using the profits from private developments such as North Road is an effective way to offset the cost of building more affordable social housing, which continues to be our top housing priority.

"Over the next 30 years we'll be directly investing £1bn in housing in Stevenage, building hundreds of new homes. Our ongoing £45m Major Refurbishment Contract will also see us improving many existing council properties so that they remain sustainable, safe and comfortable."

These latest planning approvals are a significant milestone for the town as they take the number of approved homes in the pipeline waiting to be constructed to 278 with a further 40 homes already being built and due for completion later this year.

Cllr Sharon Taylor, Leader of



Stevenage Borough Council, is particularly pleased that these new homes are spread throughout the town and first and foremost are being constructed on previously developed land.

"Very few dispute the need for greater numbers of affordable new homes," she added, "but finding places to put them will sometimes divide opinion. It's great that in Stevenage we are increasing the pace of our delivery, consulting local communities and making sure that we are building throughout the town."

# Visitor centre now open



The £1bn, 20-year regeneration of our town centre is well underway and our new Visitor Centre is now open in the Town Square. Visitors will be able to learn about all of our development programmes including SG1 and Queensway along with finding out more about the history of Stevenage. The Centre contains a full 3D fly-through of all our upcoming schemes, exclusive videos, scale models and a Lego table for youngsters - and older Lego fans - to design their town of the future.

In addition, we have also launched a brand new website www. Stevenage-Even-Better.com and new social media channels (@StevenageBetter on Instagram and Twitter) that can provide you with extra information about our plans for regeneration. You can check out our interactive map covering all of the different schemes as well as having the opportunity to 'Write Your Own Story' and tell us what it is you love about our town in your own words. We'll be regularly updating both the website and Visitor Centre so check back regularly for all the latest news.

# The figures below correct those in the Winter 2018 issue of the Chronicle about Government grant losses.


since 2011 the Council has seen a steady reduction in central government grant. The cumulative loss of grant over the last nine years is now over £5.3Million pounds.


The need to find budget reductions since 2011 has not just resulted from central government grant reductions, but has been compounded by other government policy changes e.g. apprenticeship levy, national insurance changes, reductions in housing benefit administration grant and service pressures from initiatives such as benefit freezes and other welfare reforms.

The total identified savings implemented since 2011 amount to over £10m which has been needed to cover the loss of central government funding, changes in government policy, inflation and service pressures. (Extract of final General Fund budget report, February 2019)

In 2019/20 the council will receive no revenue support grant. The government is also currently assessing the proportion of their business rates that councils will keep from 2020/21.

There are also likely to be funding pressures arising from the government around areas such as the safety of homes, universal credit and homelessness. The impact of inflation, potential further reductions in resources and changes in government policy means that the council will continue to need to find savings for the next few years.
