Stevenage News Round-up

Have your say

In September, we will be holding a consultation on a 'Design Guidance Supplementary Planning Document'. What that means in English is that we want you to have your say on the details that are in our Local Plan - providing guidance for all of our developments across the town. The design guidance follows 10 characteristics from the 'National Design Guide' which are:

- Context
- Identity
- Built form
- Movement
- Nature
- Public spaces
- Uses
- Homes and buildings
- Resources
- Lifespan

The consultation will also include a section specific for the development in the town centre to make sure all regeneration work follows a standard that is fitting for the town. The guidance will provide information on what we expect to see from all developments in terms of design, character and open space, from large sites providing lots of homes, to individual residential extensions.

The consultation, along with supporting documents will be live on our website from Monday 5 September to Monday 17 October 2022.

Hard copies will be available in both the town libraries and the council office.

Summer of Play

The Play and Wellbeing team is looking forward to a busy summer. From 25 July until 31 August, an exciting programme of activities will be delivered at the town's three play centres, with 'Pop up play' sessions in Symonds Green and parks close to you.

All details on the Summer Play sessions will be on our website www.stevenage.gov.uk, social media and also through the schools. Just to let you know, we're celebrating National Play Day on Wednesday 3 August at all of our Play Centres. Look out for more information on social media next month.

Booking is recommended for all of our activities as we do get quite busy, we'll be sharing our new booking system with you all soon.

This service is for children aged 5-12 years, who live in Stevenage, under 5's with their parents /carers can attend too. The Play and Wellbeing service is pleased to be part of the HAPpy programme and working in partnership with the Young People's Healthy Hub (YPHH).

Fly tipping

Fly tipping is a crime which costs up to £392 million a year countrywide to fix. Local authorities dealt with 1.13 million fly-tipping incidents in 2020/21, up by 16% from 2019/20. So what is being put in place to stop this?



The good news is that our

local Recycling Centre, run by Hertfordshire County Council, is now allowing residents to dispose of a reasonable amount of DIY materials, previously they significantly limited how much residents with this sort of waste could dispose of. The aim of this change is to prevent fly tipping offences so everyone can get rid of waste easily and responsibly.

Transforming Our Town – Bus Interchange, Car Park & repurposing the bus station

Our town centre is being transformed through a £1billion regeneration programme. We are delivering a town centre that everyone can benefit from – reflecting the aspirations of our people and businesses, while celebrating our heritage and character.

Stevenage has many existing cherished attributes and we are building on these to enhance the town and create a place where people want to live, work and enjoy themselves.

TOWNS FUND PROJECTS

In the last edition of The Chronicle, we told you about the Towns Fund projects that the community has helped shape. These projects have now all been approved by the Stevenage Development Board – which is the independent body responsible for overseeing the Stevenage Towns Fund. We are now a step closer to the projects being delivered, bringing a wide range of benefits with them.

VACANT BUS STATION

Now that the new Stevenage bus interchange is operational, the former bus station on Danestrete provides a great regeneration opportunity.

Earlier in the year, we asked for your thoughts on what you would like to see this space used for. Although the wider redevelopment of the site will happen at a later date, we will be delivering a first phase of works to begin transforming this area and provide a very different look and feel.

We asked a number of questions such as: what leisure activities or events we should provide, and what food facilities should be on offer? Our survey told us:

- 82% of responders would like to see new facilities at the space
- 65% of responders would like music performances at the space
- A number of other suggestions for a community area included dance shows, comedy performances, markets, parks and art exhibitions.
- 70% of responders would like to experience ice skating or roller skating as part of our leisure offering
- Other leisure suggestions included arcade games, community yoga, skateboarding, treasure hunts and water play
- Almost 90% of responders would like to see street food or a food court at the space

When the full Garden Square regeneration works begin, we are going to include some of these concepts in the scheme too.

STEVENAGE BETTER a place for everyone

BUS INTERCHANGE

The Stevenage bus interchange was completed in May 2022.

Work started on the project in late 2020, funded by a £9.6 million Local Growth Fund investment from Hertfordshire Local Enterprise Partnership. The interchange features an extensive canopy with a large glazed screen and automatic doors for improved safety and easy passenger access. It also has a passenger facilities building which provides a heated waiting area with extensive seating, live passenger information boards, a café, fully accessible toilet and changing facilities and mobility services.

The new pedestrian connection to the train station provides an easily accessible route between the interchange, town square and the train station, linking our main transport hubs with attractive planting, seating and improved lighting along the route. We're really pleased with the interchange and hope everyone in Stevenage is too.

REPLACING RAILWAY NORTH CAR PARK

The Railway North car park has now closed as construction starts on a new £9m multistorey car park, being delivered by specialist contractor Huber.

The new parking facility will deliver an increased number of spaces on the site. 622 will be provided including 30 blue badge spaces. At least 30 spaces will be available for electric vehicles, with the scope to increase charging facilities as electric vehicles become more popular in the future. Secure parking for 80 bikes will also be included. Situated at the gateway to Stevenage town centre, the facility will offer a more enjoyable experience for those arriving at the station.



Clustered together with the Stevenage bus interchange and the railway station, this development will help create a sustainable travel hub, creating a number of travel options for people both from Stevenage and across Hertfordshire who use the railway station or bus interchange.

Thank you for your understanding as these works take place. We're asking those who usually use the Railway North car park to use St George's Way multistorey instead, which is a short walk from the railway station – around six minutes. The Triangle Car Park has also been reopened for Season Ticket holders.

Investment and Jobs in Life Sciences

Those who have visited the town centre recently may have seen work happening on the former Marshgate car park. The site is being developed into a European HQ for biopharmaceutical manufacturer, Autolus Therapeutics. This development will produce life-saving cancer treatments, to bring enormous benefits to the people of Stevenage, including employment and apprenticeship opportunities for the next generation.

Work on the 81,000 sq ft building began in November

2021 and is scheduled for completion in 2023.

Stevenage has a proud history of supporting the life sciences sector, which continues with the development of the Marshgate site for Autolus, which specialises in cell and gene therapies to offer new treatments to cancer patients

The development highlights the importance of Stevenage as a key location for the life sciences industry and its position within the UK's 'golden triangle' of academic centres, comprising London, Cambridge and Oxford.

Clean, Green, Safe & Thriving: Biodiversity



B iodiversity is a word that is bandied around to mean a variety of different things, but what does it actually mean?

The easiest way to describe 'biodiversity', in a nutshell, is: all of the living things on our planet – from the smallest bacteria to the largest plants and animals. It is the backbone of a healthy ecosystem and without this, things like the air we breathe and food we eat would be in much shorter supply.

So how is the council making sure we are looking after the local ecosystem?

Stevenage is very much an urban environment, benefitting from large public open spaces, which are popular and well-used by local people.

But woodlands and hedgerows still remain a feature within the town and it is those features that are home to the majority of the town's wildlife.

Our Biodiversity Action Plan

We asked Herts & Middlesex Wildlife Trust to develop a Biodiversity Action Plan for Stevenage. Believe it or not, Stevenage is currently the only district authority to have a plan like this in place - so we are leading the way on protecting our ecosystem.

Green Space Volunteers

Do you want to help maintain our green spaces across the town? Why not become a Green Space Volunteer?

What do Green Space Volunteers do?

Green Space Volunteers
help improve community
outdoor spaces around the
town. The volunteers help
out at a number of different
types of locations including
parks, woodlands and ponds.



Work may include woodland ride maintenance and bulb planting, ecological surveys, improvements to ponds and the installation of bird and bat boxes.

How much time do I need to give?

Volunteers are welcome to come along for as much or as little time as they like - everybody's help is welcomed and valued. Activities normally take place at weekends, although there may be some opportunity for mid-week volunteering.

What skills or experience do I need?

We welcome everyone and no previous experience is required. You just need to enjoy working outdoors and want to make a difference to the town. If you have any particular skills, experience and knowledge that you think might be useful, please let us know.

All volunteering sessions are supervised by a suitably qualified member of our staff or one of our partners who will provide support and training throughout the activity.

How do I become a Green Space Volunteer?

Residents' Survey Actions from our local research



ast autumn, we asked an independent research company to conduct a survey to understand what matters to you, our residents. We regularly commission surveys like this to help us understand what your priorities are for the town, gauge local opinions and ask how well people think the council is performing. The last survey was done in 2017, so this one, completed at the back end of last year, helped us gauge residents' views over time and also compare it against the national benchmark provided by the Local Government Association. A representative sample of over 750 local residents took part in a phone survey, and anonymously gave their views.

A key finding from the survey was that more Stevenage residents are satisfied with their local area as a place to live (84%) than at any other time in the last decade, and above the national average (78%).

People also told us that compared to 2017:

- They feel a stronger sense of belonging to their local area
- Their local area is a place where people from different ethnic backgrounds get on well together
- They feel safer during the day and after dark

Residents' top priorities for the coming years included:

- Reducing crime and anti-social behaviour
- Clean streets, cycle ways and pavements
- Activities and support for children & younger people
- Ensuring a range of affordable housing to buy or rent
- Well-maintained parks and green spaces
- A regenerated town centre and leisure park
- Good household waste and recycling collections
- Good local shops and facilities in their neighbourhood
- Good health and leisure facilities

Residents had a high level of satisfaction with the way the council runs things, with 62% saying they were satisfied, up from 56% in 2017, and above the national benchmark of 56%.

The perception of value for money that the council provides was the highest it had been in a decade at 52% agreeing they got value for money, and above the national benchmark (43%).

What are we doing with this new information?

As a result of the survey, we will be:

- Confirming our priorities are still the right ones
- Looking at where people from different neighbourhoods and backgrounds had different priorities and experiences
- Using this to inform the planning and delivery of our services
- Holding local conversations and engagement activities to understand things better, and to plan local action
- Making sure we keep people informed about what we are doing

We are keen to hear more about what matters to you, and will be organising more sessions so you can have your say right across the town over the next six months.
