Finally, thank you for taking part in Local Elections in May. All 39 ward seats were up for election due to the 2023 Boundary Commission Review in Stevenage, and it was the first all-out council elections in the town for 25 years. The council is now made up of 32 Labour councillors, six Liberal Democrat councillors, and one Conservative councillor. I am pleased to remain the Leader of the Council and it will be a great privilege to continue to serve this town and support residents, businesses, and community groups.

Stevenage News Round-up

Refurbished play areas due to open in summer

Children will soon be able to enjoy exciting and accessible new play equipment at eight refurbished play areas in Stevenage.

Our play area refurbishment programme has taken an exciting step forward, with £455,000 being spent on the refurbishment of seven sites.

Earlier this year, we asked residents and children the top five items of play equipment they would most like to see in the new designs. Over 250 children helped to decide on what should be included. New equipment will include trampolines, a group swing and activity trails. The council also worked with Make Space for Girls and will be incorporating lots of innovative and social fun hang out spaces for girls to enjoy, particularly at Canterbury Way Playing Field, which is only possible due to its size.

The council is now working with suppliers who will be delivering the new play areas. Work has started to the following sites:

- Lapwing Rise (work is now complete)
- Shearwater Close
- Parishes Mead
- Camps Hill

And work is due to start soon at Canterbury Way Playing Field.

Work to Riccat Lane and Chancellors Road play areas has started and re-open this summer, with the aim of re-opening in early August. The Town Centre Gardens play area is also due to re-open in September.



May's Local Elections Results

Earlier this year, the first all-out council elections were held in Stevenage for 25 years.

The council is now made up of 32 Labour councillors, six Liberal Democrat councillors, and one Conservative councillor. Cllr Richard Henry remains Leader of the Council with a Labour majority. (Contact details on pages 14-15).

Making Stevenage Even Better Corporate Plan (2024-27)

Our new corporate plan, **Making Stevenage Even Better**, outlines the council's priorities for the next three years.

The plan represents what matters to residents and provides a strong foundation and clear direction of travel for us.

Making Stevenage Even Better builds upon the long-term objectives of the previous corporate plan, Future Town Future Council (2016-2024), and reflects the views of over 3,000 residents. These views have been categorised as follows:

- Transforming Our Town
- More Social, Affordable and Good Quality Homes
- Thriving Neighbourhoods
- Tackling Climate Change
- Balancing the Budget

Underpinning these priorities are three cross-cutting themes:

1. **Equality, Diversity & Inclusion**
2. **Health & Wellbeing**
3. **Technology & Innovation**

The inclusion of these themes highlights the need to raise the awareness of these areas when designing and delivering services.



They reflect important social benefits and demonstrate the value the council places on creating effective partnerships to build more homes for local people, regenerate the town and improve lives.

Following formal consultation with residents, local businesses, partners and staff, 69% of respondents said the new council priorities captured what matters to them. Thank you to everyone who took the time to respond to the survey, we really appreciate your input, to shape our services.

Monitoring council performance against the priorities of Making Stevenage Even Better (2024-27) officially began on 1 April 2024. It ensures that we hold ourselves accountable and provides an opportunity to promote our successes.

As a council, we know that over the next three years, difficult financial decisions will need to be made to balance the budget. Effective communication, robust performance monitoring and a commitment to the outcomes and actions set out in Making Stevenage Even Better will provide a foundation from which we can collectively make our town an even better place to live, work, and visit.

Transforming Our Town

Arts and culture in Stevenage

Stevenage has a rich history and heritage, and offers a wide range of culture and art for everybody to enjoy. A key part of transforming the town is to celebrate this and integrate our past, present, and future through arts and culture.

Last year, three pieces of urban artwork were introduced at the underpass located by Stevenage FC and Wickes at the Broadhall Way roundabout, marking the start of a series of underpass improvements. The new urban artworks will continue to reflect the history and spirit of community throughout the town.



The next phase of underpass artworks has been completed at the Monkswood Way and Six Hills Way roundabout. The council asked the local community to choose their favourite themes, and these were Stevenage Photographers, Town Centre Gardens, and Stevenage on Wheels. Hertfordshire-based artists MurWalls has designed the artworks, except for the wall dedicated to Stevenage Photographers. This wall

Elsewhere, following a call-out to commission an artist to create a new, permanent piece of public art at the Stevenage Bus Interchange, we are delighted to announce that Donna Reeves has been selected to produce this commission.

Improvements to Market Square

As part of a series of public realm improvements, works have started on Market Square in the town centre.

The council is making changes to Market Square to make it more attractive, safer for pedestrians who use the route, and offer greater visibility to the entrances of the Indoor Market and St George's Car Park.

There will be a new and improved footpath with a raised pedestrian crossing, improved lighting, and new greenery which will improve


and brighten the area, creating a safer and visually improved crossing, whilst still providing designated loading bays for businesses. Pedestrian safety is a priority, and these works will create ease of movement and aid those with mobility issues. Two loading bays will be relocated, and there will be no loss of blue badge parking.

Delivering more council housing for Stevenage people

Our council houses are critical in ensuring we're able to provide our residents with a safe haven to call home.

There are lots of new council housing developments underway in the town, providing a variety of different homes for people living in Stevenage. From Brodie Court, the new independent living scheme at Kenilworth Close, to the construction of some smaller sites as well, there has been lots happening in our Housing Development programme.

Kenilworth Close, Phase 1

It is really exciting to see the first phase of the Kenilworth Close development now complete, since work began in September 2020.

The build reached a significant milestone when the residents of Walpole Court were shown around some of the new flats. Feedback was excellent and they cannot wait to move into their new homes.



Each of the flats has a high-quality finish, with added extras including a roof-top garden, large communal areas, and retail units.

All the residents have moved into the council-rented properties at Chilham

House, and the final touches are currently ongoing at Brodie Court independent living scheme.

Dunn Close

Delivering 27 homes including supported accommodation, Dunn Close is due for completion later this year. Construction is well underway, with the building now watertight, the roof finished, and the guttering installed too. Scaffolding has been removed, and internal works have begun inside, with second fix electrics complete and plaster-boarding progressing well.

Work has also started on several smaller-scale sites throughout the town. Building has commenced at Stirling Close with the brickwork nearing completion and you may have noticed that ground works and the clearance of sites have also started on Valley Way and

Colestrete. These developments will provide a mixture of three and four-bed houses across the three sites.

Burwell Phase 2

Pre-commencement works will start in due course, with the development providing a total of 20 one and two-bedroom homes.

After the consultations carried out at the end of 2023, Kenilworth Phase 2 was granted approval earlier this year. The Oval was approved at the previous Planning Committee and the remaining two - Ellis Avenue and Cartref are due to be discussed later this year.

Kenilworth - Phase 2

Planning has also been granted for the second phase of Kenilworth Close which will see the demolition of Walpole Court to make way for 24 three and four-bed houses.

As of spring 2024, the Housing Development programme has delivered hundreds of homes throughout Stevenage. These include award-winning emergency short-stay accommodation, sustainable builds such as Helston House and state-of-the-art independent living schemes.

We've compiled a list of some of the most common items which either can't be recycled at home but are often put in with your kerbside collections or can be recycled at home but are often forgotten about.

Ken started his music career in Stevenage with a gig at the Mentmore pen factory in 1961 alongside his friend John Hollingworth.

He then went on to feature in Stevenage-based bands including The Jimmy Brown Sound and Kit and the Saracens, frequently gigging at the Mecca and Bowes Lyon House.

From there he moved to London, setting up a band called The Gods before becoming a co-founder of Uriah Heep in 1969, and it was that band that brought Ken major success, selling around 45 million records during his time with them. Stevenage has recognised his achievements and Ken is now on the Walk of Fame between the town and Stevenage train station.

Save our chalk streams

There are fewer than 300 chalk streams in the world, 240 are found in England, and of those 10% are in Hertfordshire. Although they are rare, they support an exceptionally high number of wildlife species, including the water vole, brown trout, and kingfisher.

The Stevenage River is a major tributary of the river Beane, one of the county's chalk streams. It used to be a renowned fishing river, and also supported watercress beds and water mills.

Hertfordshire residents use one of the highest amounts of water per person compared to other UK counties. On average we use around **157** litres per person every day, compared to the national average of **145** litres. Much of our tap water comes from the same underground natural reservoir that feeds the chalk streams. So, the more we use the bigger the threat

to our rivers and the wildlife that relies on them.

We can all play a part in helping to save water and improve our waterways. Some examples of the work already being done to achieve this include:

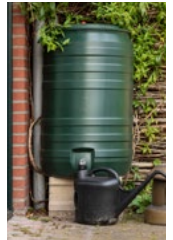
- Affinity Water has reduced the amount of water that it extracts from the underground reservoir
- We have removed the seasonal bedding displays around Stevenage to reduce the amount of water we use
- We've been working with the Environment Agency to improve the Stevenage Brook.

But there is more that can be done to help, including in our homes. At home we can:

- Turn off the tap while brushing our teeth
- Only run washing machines when full, and
- Spend less time in the shower.

In the garden we can:

- Install a water butt to collect rainwater, instead of using tap water to water the garden
- Water plants early in the morning or in the evening, and directly onto the roots to help prevent it evaporating immediately
- Avoid watering your lawn – in a healthy well-established lawn the top might turn brown, but the roots should still be alive and able to send up fresh new growth once rain arrives.

Skip into summer!

It's that time of year again when the weather cheers up and many of us take the opportunity to have a clear out in our homes.

If you have a bit more waste than you can fit in your vehicle and take to the recycling centre yourself, then you may need to use a skip. Did you know that we have a range of different skip options for house and garden clearances?

We have different sizes which can be delivered anywhere in Stevenage and the surrounding area. We also offer a dumpy bag pick up service which can save you money.

Much of the waste we collect is either recycled or goes to energy from waste facilities, with 89% of Hertfordshire waste diverted away from landfill in 2023.

So, why pick a skip? Well, not only is it convenient to have all your waste in one place, but you can keep adding to it as your project develops. Delivery and collection are all included in the one-off price, saving

you the cost of fuel and multiple trips. We can also help you make the right decision on the size you require, so you can get the right skip for the job.

If your waste is going to be generated over the course of a few days, because you might be renovating a room in your house, for example, or you have soil and rubble to get rid of, skip hire is a great choice. You will also not have to sort your waste beforehand, as we will do this after we take your skip away.

In addition, we have recently opened our drive-in and drop-off service for commercial customers. Leader of the Council, and Transforming Stevenage, Communications and Strategic Partnerships

The Leader holds specific responsibility for Modernisation of Local Government, which includes new political structures and the constitution; media and communications; public consultations; partnerships, regeneration, and the Civic Suite at head office.



Councillor Jeannette Thomas -
Deputy Leader, and Resources and Transformation

The Deputy Leader takes on the council's budget setting and budget monitoring (General Fund, Housing Revenue Account, Capital, and Revenue). She is also responsible for commercial and insourcing, legal, digital and transformation, including customer services and complaints, and information technology (IT).



Councillor Simon Speller -
Environment and Performance

Cllr Speller continues to lead on climate change, planning policy, corporate performance management, environmental health, and licensing, including residential and commercial services and Stevenage Direct Services - waste and recycling.



Councillor Lloyd Briscoe -
Economy, Skills, and Transport

Cllr Briscoe remains the economic development portfolio holder for the council. His remit includes engineering and parking services, transport and sustainable travel, highways, skills development, and business relationships including Town Centre management and Old Town partnership.



Councillor Jackie Hollywell -
Housing and Housing Development

Cllr Hollywell has changed portfolios and will be responsible for all things related to housing, including the council's housing strategy and policy, property repairs and maintenance, building safety, compliance and regulation, and housing development.



Councillor Sandra Barr -
Co-operative Council and Neighbourhoods

Community development, community and voluntary sector, neighbourhood management, co-operative council, and older people remain under the guidance of Cllr Barr.



Councillor Loraine Rossati -
Culture, Leisure and Wellbeing

Led by Cllr Rossati, the portfolio includes council events, culture and arts, sport and leisure, health and wellbeing, and council events.



Councillor Conor McGrath -
Stronger Communities

Joining for the first time is Cllr McGrath in a new Cabinet role tasked with building stronger communities. This will focus on community safety and enforcement, community cohesion, equalities and diversity, CCTV, and young people.

Local Plan Consultation

Stevenage Borough's Local Plan (adopted May 2019) is undergoing a partial review and update and we are seeking your views on the changes. The consultation runs from 5 July to 15 August 2024.



The Local Plan is the town's spatial development strategy which plans to 2031. It identifies the main issues that are likely to affect Stevenage and sets policies to deal with them, setting out the rules for how development is carried out. It is important to remember that the Local Plan Review, at this stage, consists of limited changes. As such, the scope of the review to policies and supporting text is limited to necessary changes only, related to key drivers of change since the Plan was adopted in 2019.

Other wider changes will be considered for the next stage of the Local Plan which entails a full review from 2025 onwards.

Anyone in Stevenage's community, including residents, workers, businesses, community organisations or visitors can comment on the changes we are proposing.

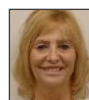

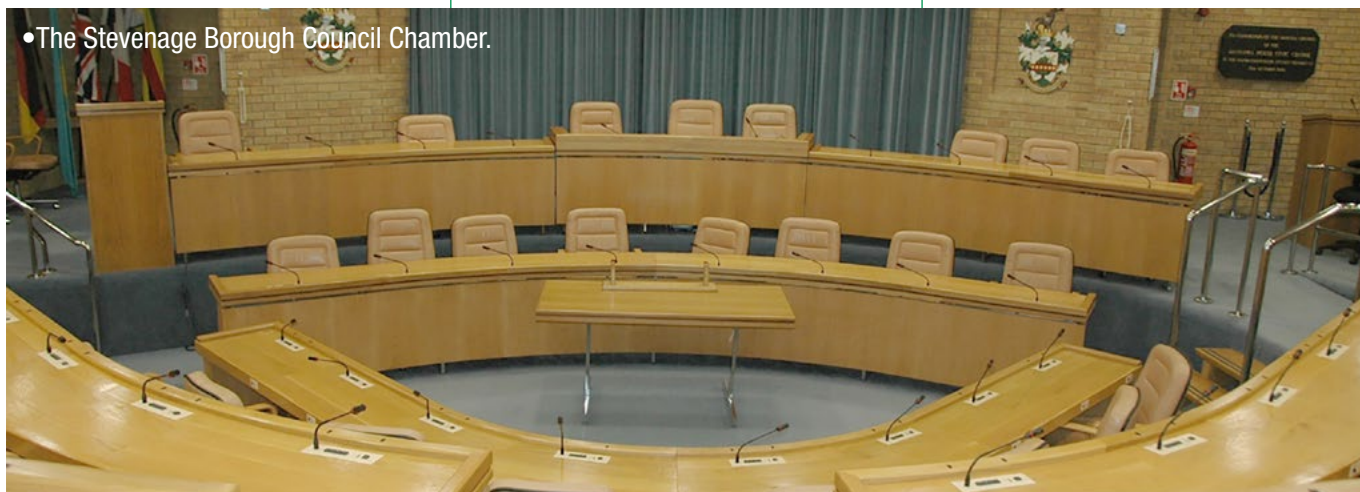

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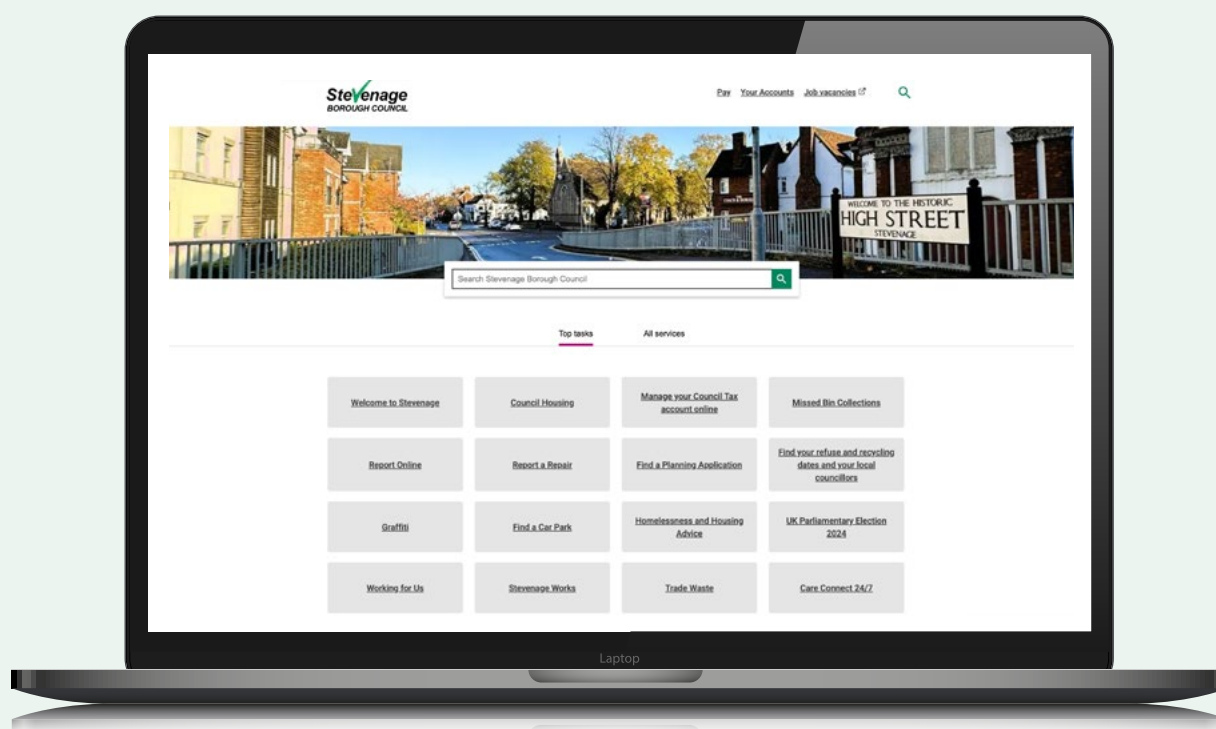
