I was delighted to support Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) careers for young people with the recent launch of our Pioneering Young People's Futures event at Airbus. As a former college tutor, I know how it can be tough to access certain career paths. The council is working alongside several industry leaders, North Herts College, and the Hertfordshire Local Enterprise Panel (LEP). The aim is to use it to encourage local people to develop skills in areas such as life sciences and sports science with a view to supporting and securing employment within local businesses and I am committed to supporting this initiative.

The housing scheme was completed in late September and will deliver 29 homes for social rent. It has been exciting to watch Helston House go from plan to reality. Delivering more council-rented homes is a top priority for us.

There was lots of delicious food such as Jerk Chicken, Filipino Cuisine and much more. The event included music workshops at Junction 7 Creatives and story time from around the world at Stevenage Central Library.

Transforming Our Town

An award-winning car park for Hertfordshire

The Railway North multistorey car park, which opened in May 2023, has received two awards, demonstrating its excellence across a range of criteria.

Earlier this year, the car park was awarded Park Mark Plus accreditation, the first car park in Hertfordshire to receive it.

Park Mark Plus recognises car parks which demonstrate the highest quality of services, operations, design, and build. The award means that the car park provides police-approved accredited parking and has reached the standards of the Disabled Parking Accreditation.



More recently, the facility was jointly awarded 'Best New Car Park' in a town or city at this year's British Parking Awards. To deliver an excellent driving and parking experience, there are no columns to help with manoeuvring and the car park benefits from solar panels to aid sustainability.

The car park, delivered by contractor HUBER Car

Park Systems UK, is one of the projects to have received funding from the Government's Towns Fund, of which Stevenage was awarded £37.5m. A contribution of £1.1m for the facility was part of the multi-million pound Growth Deal funding secured by Hertfordshire Local Enterprise Partnership for Stevenage regeneration.

Helston House, from plan to reality

Delivering more council rented homes is a top priority for us. Helston House, Scarborough Avenue delivers just that, providing 29, one, two and three-bedroom apartments for the town.

A community open day was held recently which provided a great opportunity to show councillors and residents this sustainable new build, as well as take them on a tour of the development. Everyone had an opportunity to ask questions and find out more about the sustainable aspects, including air source heat pumps, added thermal fabric insulation, triple glazing, LED lighting throughout and solar panels to name but a few.

A special thank you goes to the teachers and children from Woolenwick Primary School who have been busy with their artistic skills again. Initially, they designed the hoarding which was erected around the site when construction first commenced, and when they visited earlier this year to see the building and meet the builders, they designed drawings welcoming the new tenants to their homes.

Helston House is a sustainable pilot scheme that is leading the way in helping us to define the quality of our wider housing development programme and improve the properties being let to our council tenants. The sustainable design of the building not only reduces the environmental impact of construction, but also helps to lower utility bills for residents.

Helston House benefits from:

- Zero gas
- Onsite Green Energy Generation through Photo Voltaic Panels
- Enhanced building fabric insulation
- Triple glazing throughout the scheme
- Grey water heat recovery
- LED lighting throughout

Kenilworth Close Handover

This week councillors also viewed the first stage of the Kenilworth Close development.



The mixed tenure scheme includes a total of 236 homes, with 118 being allocated for council rent.

Initially it includes the completion of 33 apartments for private sale, as well 24 allocated for council rent, due to be completed shortly.

Councillors took the time to visit the scheme and have a look round the high-quality private homes and the council rent apartments which will be ready to let to council tenants soon.

5-Star Quality Approach

All our new housing developments are designed to adhere to our 5-Star quality approach, which is helping us to define the quality of our wider programme. It helps us to ensure developments are sustainable, affordable for new tenants and make best use of the assets we have available. The five principles are:

From August to November, a form is sent to every household in the town so we can gather accurate information about who lives in each property and who is eligible to vote.

Some households are required to respond, so please check your form, and use this to tell us who is eligible to vote, even if there are no updates to the printed details.

There are several quick and easy ways you can do this below:

- If the information printed on the form is correct, text your security codes and "No Changes" to 07800 006816. (standard network charges apply).
- If the information printed on the form is incorrect, call 08000 488682 (freephone number) and when prompted enter your security codes or visit www. stevenage.gov.uk/electoralcanvass and enter them.

Alternatively, if the information printed on the form is incorrect or changes are required, complete it and post it back to us in the envelope provided (postage is paid for by the council).

Christmas clothing

Are you thinking about buying a new Christmas jumper or a party dress for New Year's Eve? Think again because it takes 2,700 litres of water to make just one t-shirt. That's enough water for one person for 900 days.

Increasing the wearable life of an item by just three months reduces the carbon, water, and waste foot-prints by between 5%-10%, so why not choose a 'new to you' option instead?

- Green is the new black shop second hand on apps such as Vinted and Depop
- Have another look in your wardrobe, check out your local charity shop, swap jumpers between friends or customise old outfits to fight fast fashion and save some money.

• Go for longevity – wear your Christmas jumper with pride all winter long.

Do you need inspiration on sustainable gift buying? Always use the green gift giver mantra: want, need, wear, read.

Tree-mendous Christmas decoration tips

If you're buying an artificial Christmas tree, buy one to last so you can use it year on year.

If you're buying a real Christmas tree, look for a young one in a pot so it can live in the garden year-round.

Don't forget that you can recycle real Christmas trees in your brown bin or place it by the side of your bin on collection day, up until the end of January. Make sure to remove all decorations from your tree.

Buy good quality decorations, so they last for many Christmases to come.

Reuse Christmas cards as gift tags or to write shopping lists on.

One person's rubbish is another's Christmas present. Items in good

Did you know that 1 in 10 gifts are never used? That's a waste of money and materials.

condition that you no longer want can be donated for re-use or re-sale at reuse centres, charity shops, or even by selling them online – disposal should always be the last resort.

Don't buy novelty items or knickknacks no-one is going to use. Remember: want, need, wear, read when shopping for gifts, or just in general. And pop in the gift receipt just in case.

Gift wrapping

Help reduce the 277,000 miles of wrapping paper going to landfill each year by avoiding glossy, glittery, or metallic gift wrap which cannot be recycled. Instead, try brown / craft paper tied up with ribbon or string and a nice tag. If you're likely to reuse it, opt for the best quality wrapping paper you can as it won't rip upon opening. Or ditch the rolls of wrapping paper entirely and go for fabric gift wrap (furoshiki) recycled paper, or a reusable gift bag.

#WorthSaving-Save Food, Save Money

Did you know that almost a quarter of waste in bins is edible food?

Research shows that around £720 is wasted per household each year by throwing away edible food.

It is easy to give food waste the chop just by tweaking what we do across **four steps to save**.

1 Plan – check what you have

- Check your fridge and cupboards so you know what you have and only buy what you need.
- Plan your meals for the week ahead based on what your household is up to

2 Shop – buy what you need

- Use your meal plan as the basis of your shopping list
- Writing a list and sticking to it can save up to £11 per shop.
- Only choose multi-buy offers if you'll eat it it's not a bargain if it goes in the bin.

3 Store – is the best way

- Storing food in the best way keeps it fresher for longer
- Most fruit and veg do well in the fridge, but not bananas. Keep potatoes in the dark
- Use by dates are about food safety. Eating food past the date could make you ill. Best before dates, however, are about food quality – most food is fine to eat after this date, but check it first

4 Eat – what you have

- One of the top five reasons for wasting food in Hertfordshire is not eating what we cook
- Knowing how much to cook means getting portions
 right
- Cook once, eat twice save time and money by preparing extra portions when you cook to eat another day

Meet CIIr Lloyd Briscoe Economy and Transport



Hi Lloyd, please tell us a bit about yourself?

I originally came to Stevenage when I was 12 years old. My father was involved in professional football and relocated the family here to take up an appointment with the old Stevenage Town FC. We lived in Green Street. My teenage sister worked in Letchworth, my younger brother went to Almond Hill school whilst I went to the Barclay school. Marrying at the Holy Trinity church, my two sons (Adam and Sam) maintained the Barclay alumni connection, whilst I would go on to become a governor there, serving for some 16 years.

What made you want to become a councillor?

When I was 18, I met Shirley Williams, who was our MP at the time. We had an in-depth chat about me becoming a councillor, but as events turned out it took me 40 years before I pursued the option. Working as a councillor has provided me with some challenging and exciting experiences. To be able to give something back to my community is so gratifying. Working together with other organisations allows me a unique opportunity to be able to shape the future of Stevenage for generations to come.

I love engaging with people from differing backgrounds who make up Stevenage. Everyone has a tale to tell, and I love hearing them. I am really enthusiastic about what the future holds for Stevenage, with the re-generation plans and the growth of major businesses here. These are truly exciting times.



What do you like to do in your spare time?

I am passionate about local football. For 10 years, I was the chair of the Stevenage Borough Juniors Football Club, a local community organisation that thrives and prospers to this day.

I have been involved with the senior football club at Broadhall Way in one way or another since 1968. I am the chair of the Stevenage FC Supporters' Association and I'm the club's historian too. I currently spend many, many hours at the British Library, researching for a book about the history of football in Stevenage, going back to its origins in 1884.

The rest of my spare time is spent with my partner for nearly 25 years, Sarah. Our shared passion is the theatre and travelling.

Could you tell us a bit more about your portfolios?

I have responsibilities for Economy and Transport. For over 45 years I have worked in the private sector, mostly involved in the Logistics industry, so the fit seems natural. I get to meet business leaders in small to medium enterprises, as well as the big employers in the town. Stevenage is a business-friendly town and I have a passion to make it even "friendlier". I'm lucky. I get to meet inspirational, dynamic people whom I consider (as individuals) to be fundamental assets to the town.

I also get to oversee the council's involvement regarding essential infrastructure such as the railway station and the bus interchange.

What projects are you currently involved in?

Much of the Transport component of my portfolio is based on our car parks. I was pleased to be part of a team who received a national 'Car Park of the Year 'award recently, a most gratifying accolade for our town.

Other components of my portfolio dovetail into various executive functions, such as the Gateway project and encouraging more businesses to come to our town. I am currently involved in discussions regarding a heritage-related opportunity, which I'm really excited about.
