A minor inconvenience initially, it has developed into a considerable problem for residents. The car park to the rear of High Street and Lytton Way has never been fully used. Originally, just a lorry park if leased or taken over by the council it could serve more as a local facility with visitors encouraged by clear signage to use it. It is important to remember that commuters into London come not just from Stevenage but surrounding villages and towns to take advantage of the fast trains from Stevenage.
